2.1 Field work

2.1.1 SYSTEMATIC

CEQUA/INACH

Six systematic surveys on humpback whales were conducted in Magellan Strait and adjacent channels, between May 2006 to February/March 2007 on board M/V *Chonos*.

One marine survey was conduced between the Cape Horn and Antarctic Peninsula (Bransfield and Gerlache Straits) as part of the Project INACH 163 (Aguayo-Lobo *et al.* 1998) during the 43rd Chilean Antarctic Scientific Expedition, on board R/V *Contralmirante Oscar Viel* and ATF *Leucoton* during January 2007.

CCC

Systematic surveys from land, marine and aerial platforms have been carried out by CCC in different regions of Chile since 2003 in order to determine the geographical and seasonal distribution of great whales.

Under the Alfaguara Project, CCC conducted from 01 February to 29 April 2007, seventeen marine surveys on board artisan fishing vessels and one aerial survey on board Chilean Marine Navy aircraft.

Marine surveys were oriented to photo-identification and conducted during one day, thus cetacean groups were approached after detection.

During preliminary results on fifteen out of seventeen marine surveys, sightings included at least 126 groups of 156 individuals of blue whales, 4 groups of 5 individuals of humpback whales and one group of between 10 to 20 Risso's dolphin.

Feeding behavior and defecation was recorded for both whale species.

Individual photo-identification on blue whales during 2007 for left and right side respectively, resulted in 80 individual blue whales, including seven between years and sixteen within year recaptures; and 74 individual blue whales, including nine between years and fourteen within year recaptures.

The aerial survey was conducted in zig-zag transect and surveyed about 1.500 km from 35° S to 44° S. Sightings included at least 14 groups of blue whales comprising 18 individuals, one group of one individual humpback whale, 5 groups of twelve individual sperm whales and a mixed group of Risso's dophin and southern right whale dolphins comprising more than 120 individuals.

CENTRO EUTROPIA

Systematic work has been conducted in the Humboldt Penguin National Reserve and the Isla Chañaral and individuals. Opportunistically sightings of other greater groups of bottlenose dolphins have been Islas Choros-Damas Marine Protected Area. During 2006 and 2007, behavioral observations, movements as well as breeding and feeding areas have been recorded for bottlenose dolphins. Resident population is about 40 encountered and 130 individuals have been catalogued.

2.1.2 OPPORTUNISTIC, PLATFORMS OF OPPORTUNITY

CEQUA/INACH

During the systematic surveys of CEQUA/INACH at the Magellan Strait and adjacent channels, and between the Cape Horn and Antarctic Peninsula, other cetacean species were recorded opportunistically, including Antarctic and dwarf minke whale, sei whale, Peale's dolphins.

CCC / Chilean Navy

Sightings reported to CCC by members of the Chilean Marine Mammal Sighting Network (MMSN) in 2006 along the Chilean coast included 145 additional sightings comprising at least 535 great whales and 406 small cetaceans. Most of the sightings were reported by the Chilean Navy.

Of the total sightings, in 10 opportunities the species were positively identified from pictures and included southern right whale (n=1), sperm whale (n=1), humpback whale (n=3), pilot whales (n=1), Peale's dolphin (n=2) and Risso's dolphin (n=2).

Additional records received during austral summer 2007 included sightings of blue whale, sei whale and Peale's dolphin. (Contact person: Barbara Galletti/CCC)

CENTRO EUTROPIA

During systematic surveys at Islas Choros-Damas or Isla Chañaral Marine Protected Area, other cetacean species were recorded opportunistically, including Risso's dolphin, three southern right whale dolphins, eleven sightings of 2 to 4 individual fin whales, four sightings of 2 to 4 individual blue whales and two sightings of 2 to 3 individual humpback whale.

2.2 ANALYSES/DEVELOPMENT OF TECHNIQUES

CEQUA/ INACH

Analyses are conducted to investigate the temporary and spatial distribution, group size, reproductive rates and feeding modes of humpback whales of Magellan Strait by CEQUA/INACH. In addition, one report on dwarf minke whale in Antarctic Area I and II is presented to IWC of this year (Acevedo *et al.*, 2007: SC/59/IA24).

During the six systematic surveys on humpback whales conducted in Magellan Strait and one survey between the Cape Horn and Antarctic Peninsula by CEQUA/INACH, photo identification was undertaken on all the sightings. Opportunistic photo identification was conducted on Antarctic minke and Sei whales.

CCC

Blue whale sightings made in the northwestern Chiloe Island during 2007 had been preliminary analyzed and reported (Galletti Vernazzani *et al.*, 2007).

Abundance estimates of blue whales trough capture-recapture and line-transect methods are under development.

3.2 Analyses/development of techniques

CEQUA/INACH

Analyses of the migratory destinations of humpback whales from the Magellan Strait were recently published by Acevedo et al. (2007). This analysis is an ongoing effort and is updated.

<u>CCC</u>

Photo-identification techniques for blue whales were made following Sears et al. (1990).

The 2004/2005 CCC photo-ID catalogue was provided to Cascadia Research for comparison with the East Pacific blue whale catalogue (A. Douglas, Cascadia Research, per. comm.). No matches were found between the 14 photo-IDs from 2004/2005 CCC catalog and the subset of 55 identifications Cascadia had for the Eastern Tropical Pacific (which includes photos from Costa Rica, Galapagos and Peru primarily collected by Southwest Fisheries Science Center, Cascadia Research and Whale Conservation Institute). Catalogued individuals of humpback whales were compared to the Antarctic Humpback Whale Catalogue and no matches have been found (Allen *et al.*, 2007).

CEQUA/INACH

The latest genetic analysis of humpback whales from the Magellan Strait and Antarctic Peninsula feeding areas was reported to the workshop for the Comprehensive Assessment of Southern Hemisphere Humpback Whales held in Hobart, April 2006 (Olavarría *et al.* 2006). This report included a comparison with breeding areas, based in a recently published analysis (Olavarría *et al.*, 2007).

A recent comparison of the Magellan Strait and Antarctic Peninsula feeding areas and the breeding ground of Ecuador is presented in this meeting (Felix *et al.*, 2007: SC/59/SH11)

8. Strandings

CEQUA/INACH

Two stranded were recorded. One involved two sperm whales (*Physeter macrocephalus*) stranded in the eastern entrance of the Magellan Strait. Another stranding involved 13 individual pilot whale (*Globicephala melas*) stranded in southern Chile, at Navarino Island, in the Beagle channel.

CCC

The total reported strandings for this period was 8 including 20 animals. Species stranded included sperm whale (n=3), fin whale (n=1), pilot whale (n=1, 12 individuals plus one additionally dead whale at sea), strap-toothed whale (n=1) and unidentified large whales (n=2, 3 individuals).
